International Competition

The University of Louisville is pleased to announce the annual competition for the best idea promoting improved world order published or presented from January 2004 through December 2008. The University is able to provide the award as a result of the creative generosity of the late H. Charles Grawemeyer. The idea deemed most useful and well articulated may have an individual author or multiple authors, or may be the product of an institution or agency, and may be submitted from anywhere in the world. The award will be two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) payable in five annual installments of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000).

Purpose

The purpose of the award is to stimulate the recognition, dissemination, and critical analysis of outstanding proposals for improving world order. Submissions may address a wide range of global concerns including foreign policy and its formation; the conduct of international relations or world politics; global economic issues, such as world trade and investment; resolution of regional, ethnic or racial conflicts; the proliferation of destructive technologies; global cooperation on environmental protection or other issues; international law and organization; any combination or particular aspects of these; or any other suitable idea which could at least incrementally lead to a more just and peaceful world order. Submissions will be judged according to **originality, feasibility and potential impact** of the idea, not by the cumulative record of the nominee.

Administration

Nominations may be made from throughout the world by individual scholars, by professional associations, by university presidents or administrators, or by publishers and editors of journals and books in political science and world affairs.

Each nomination letter must be submitted in English and be accompanied by a nomination form. The nominator must set out briefly the significance of the nomination and why it is presumed worthy of the award. The idea(s) considered may be found not only in printed books and articles in scholarly or distinguished journals, but also in public speeches or other widely and publicly disseminated forms so long as they first appeared in the time frame indicated above.

All nominations must reach the University of Louisville by January 15, 2009. Please note the university will be closed December 23 through January 1 for Winter Break. Within four weeks of the nomination closing date, nominees or their publishers must submit four (4) copies of all materials. The review process will begin once a file is complete. Additional copies of nominated publications may be requested as a work advances through the selection process.

All Submissions Must Include

- The idea as published (in the case of a speech, the written text or transcript) including standard bibliographic citation information.
- Biographical materials about the author(s) of the idea or group or institution.
- A completed nomination/entry form.
- A separate nominee/release form must be completed for every author. Contributors to edited volumes are ordinarily viewed as co-authors.
- Acknowledgment that one copy of all materials submitted will become part of the permanent University Archives.
- Independent supporting materials such as book reviews and newspaper articles, if available.

Following a rigorous screening process, three finalists will be recommended to the University of Louisville Grawemeyer Award Committee, which consists of individuals representing the President of the University, the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Chair of the Department of Political Science, and up to four persons named by the President. The Committee will select the winning submission and the University Board of Trustees will grant the award.

Acceptance of the award will require personal delivery of a public address setting out and developing the winning concept or idea at the University of Louisville. Copies of the public address, in part or full, may be used by the University for promoting the award. The winner of the 2010 award will be announced after December 1, 2009.
